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# WHO WE ARE

Ma's vir Wellington is a nonprofit company based in Wellington, serving a small community facing significant challenges such as poverty, lawlessness, and social instability.

Our vision is to create a **safe** and **nurturing** environment where children and families can **experience the love of God** and grow in a relationship with Him. We believe that lasting change begins at grassroots level, and we are committed to **building strong foundations** in the lives of young children, particularly those between the ages of three and six, adults with intellectual disabilities through faith-based programs and early development initiatives.

Alongside our work with children, we walk closely with parents and caregivers—many of whom are young, absent, or extended family members such as grandparents. In a community where many are living in survival mode, we provide **support, encouragement, and practical guidance** so that caregivers do not feel alone in the vital role of raising, nurturing, and guiding their children.

Through our programs and partnerships, we strive to be a consistent source of **hope, care, and community**, reflecting **God's love** in tangible ways.

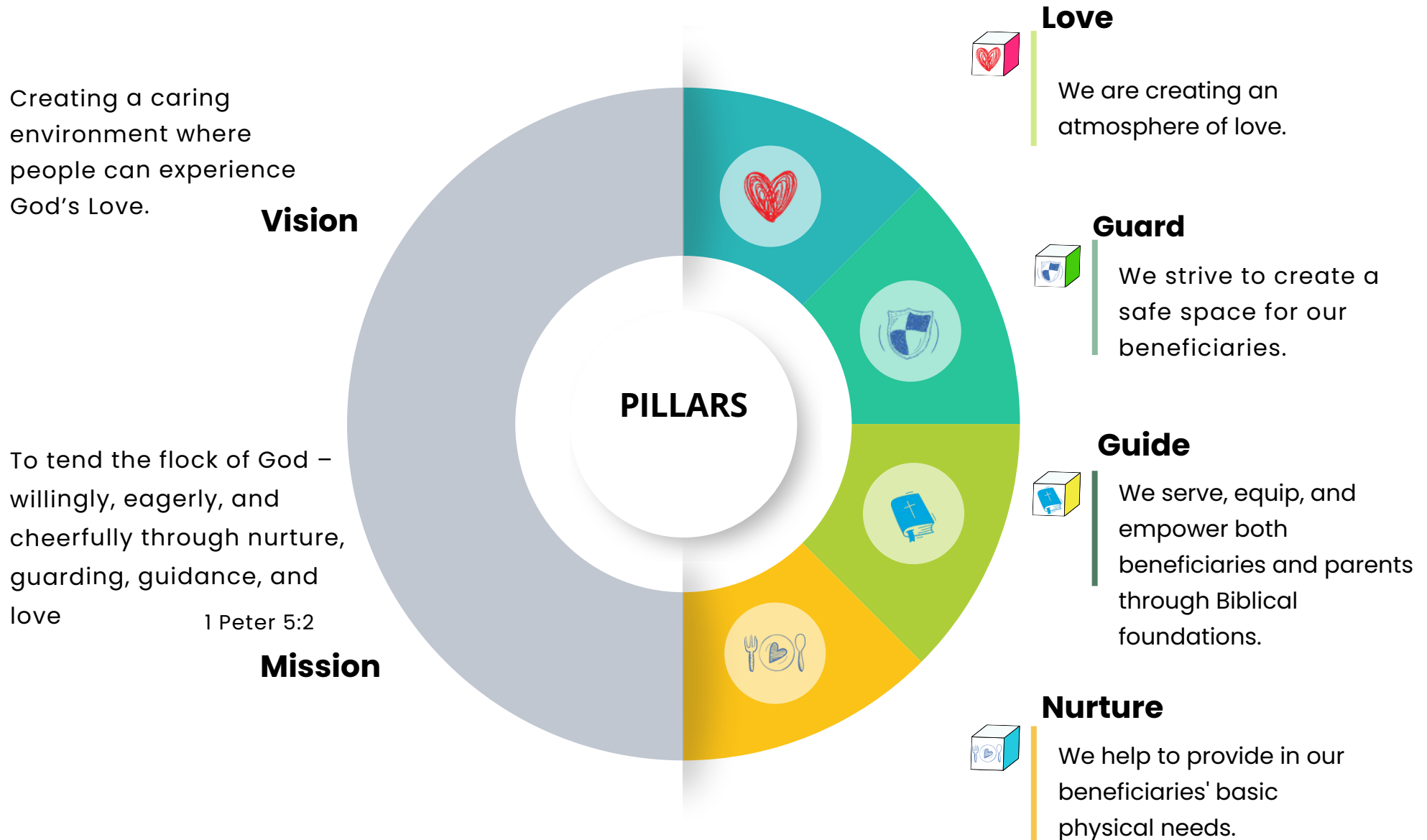

# THE GIANTS OUR COMMUNITY FACE

## A COMMUNITY UNDER PRESSURE

Our work takes place in a community facing deeply entrenched social and economic challenges. These challenges—our “giants”—are complex, overlapping, and generational.

## KEY COMMUNITY CHALLENGES

### Economic Hardship

- High levels of unemployment
- Reliance on social grants (SASSA)
- Seasonal, low-income work
- Limited access to skills development
- Parents without matric, or further education, sometimes due to early pregnancies.

### Family Instability

- High number of adolescent parents (as young as 16)
- Absent fathers and fragmented family structures
- Inconsistent parenting approaches, due to grandparents or extended family to ensure the upbringing of children.

### Unsafe Environments

- Gang violence and crime
- Domestic violence and abuse
- Substance misuse (alcohol and drugs)
- Sexual violence and exploitation
- Physical homes and structures being unsafe, and unhygienic
- No safe play grounds for children

### Limited Access to Support

- Shortage of safe houses
- Limited trauma counselling services
- Gaps in reproductive health education
- Inadequate parenting support systems
- Delayed response and limited engagement from DSD

## CALLOUT: CORE REALITY

Hopelessness, poverty, and broken family structures are not isolated issues—they shape the daily lived experience of the children and Intellectually disabled adults we serve.

# RED FLAGS IDENTIFIED



Our data, captured by our fieldworkers covering more than 117 questions, over 8 domains: *Economic stability | Food and nutrition | Health | Protection | Psychosocial wellbeing | Shelter and care | Spiritual and community support* reveals a community facing multi-dimensional poverty, where financial instability, family structure challenges, and high child dependency overlap.

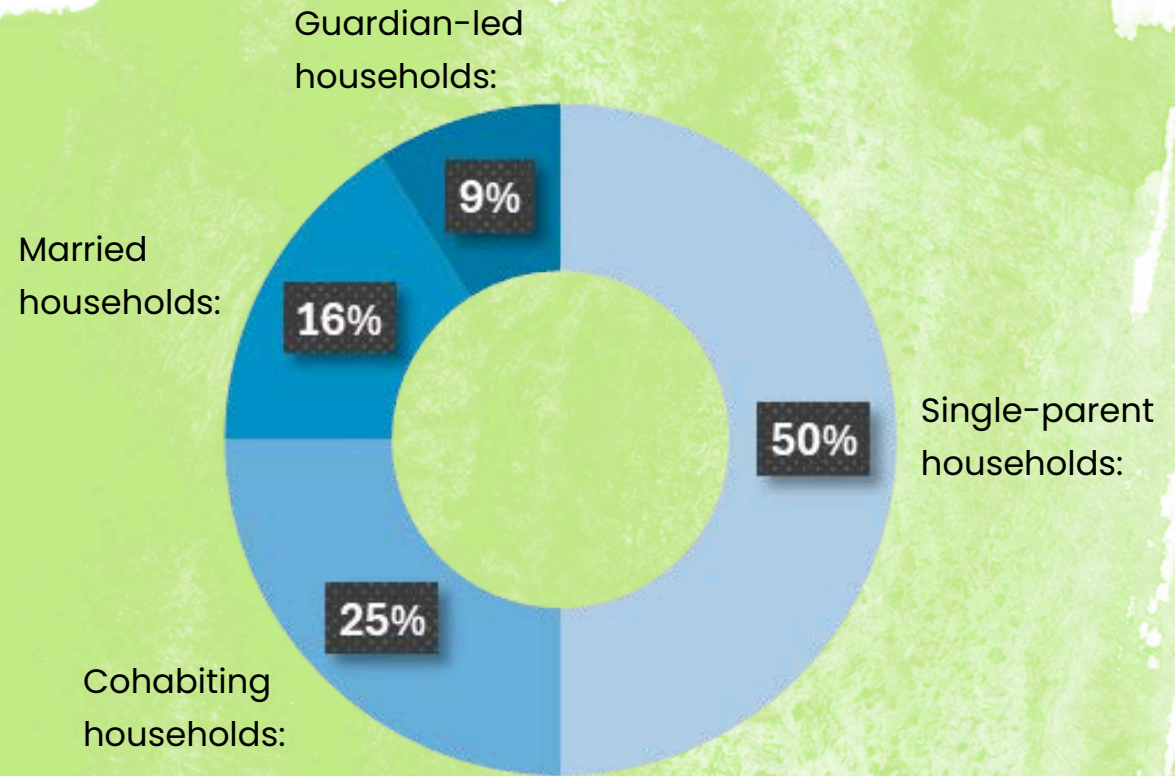

Through consistent care, development, and support, we are laying foundations that will contribute to stronger individuals, families, and communities for years to come.

## HOW WE MEASURE IMPACT

Instead of focusing only on numbers, we look for transformation:

### In Children

- From fear → confidence
- From withdrawal → expression
- From insecurity → belonging

### In intellectual disabled adults:

- From isolation → community
- From bullying and feeling unsafe → safety and security
- From outcast → purpose

### In Parents

- Completion of parenting programs
- Increased consistency and emotional engagement
- Willingness to seek help and accountability

### In Families

- Improved relationships and communication
- Healthier routines and boundaries
- Engagement in home visits and interventions

### In Spiritual Growth

- Children recalling Scripture and songs in times of fear
- Families engaging with faith as a source of hope
- Development of identity rooted in Biblical truth

## Parent to Volunteer

### FINDING PURPOSE

Nicoleen, a mother of two boys in the children's ministry, joined the program feeling overwhelmed and unsure how to guide her children. Through parent training sessions, she learned how to nurture and lead her family with confidence and love.

As she grew, Nicoleen began giving back by volunteering and later completed an Early Childhood Development certificate through Amazing Brains. Today, she works as a teacher's assistant—an achievement that reflects her growth and determination.

She is also part of the Umbombi Sisters support group and continues counselling, showing her commitment to healing and personal growth.

Nicoleen's journey is a powerful testimony of how support, training, and love can transform a life—from feeling lost to living with confidence, purpose, and hope for her family.

### MOMENTS MATTER

Every child who walks through our doors carries an invisible burden. Some may be seen as needy, naughty, or undisciplined, but we choose to see beyond the behaviour and meet the child where they are. Through co-regulation, play, song, movement, and moments of stillness, we create a safe space where children can begin to feel calm, connected, and secure. As overwhelmed emotions settle, their "thinking brain" can come alive again — eyes meeting ours, trust forming, and learning becoming possible. In these moments, children are given the freedom to breathe, to play, to grow, and simply to be children.

Canderin, a 20-year-old young woman with an intellectual disability, often faces bullying and misunderstanding in her community, leaving her isolated and overwhelmed. At Avodah, however, she finds a safe and loving environment where she is accepted for who she is. Surrounded by patience, care, and understanding,

Canderin has begun to grow in confidence, build friendships, and express her joyful and gentle nature through group activities and creative projects.

Despite challenges at home, including inconsistent support and concerns for her safety, Avodah continues to provide stability, encouragement, and a sense of belonging.

Canderin's journey is a powerful reminder of the importance of programs like Avodah, supported by MvW — environments where vulnerable individuals are seen, valued, and loved.

Katryn, our beloved therapy dog at the Avodah program, has become far more than just a companion — she is an important part of our daily support and care.

Research shows that therapy dogs can reduce anxiety, loneliness, and emotional stress for adults with disabilities, and we witness these benefits every day through the comfort and connection Katryn brings to our members. Whether she is gently walking beside a wheelchair, staying close to someone who is unwell, or bringing joy through play and affection, Katryn has a remarkable ability to sense the emotions and needs of those around her.

Her calm, patient, and accepting nature creates a sense of safety and belonging for our members, many of whom experience deep emotional connection through her presence. Katryn reminds us that healing and inclusion are often found in the simplest acts of unconditional love. She is not only part of our team, but truly part of the Avodah family.





# EMOTIONAL TAX: THE SILENT CRISIS

At Ma's vir Wellington, we witness the **impact of hope, support, and meaningful relationships** every day. We see children growing in confidence, families receiving support, and community programs bringing dignity and transformation. Yet behind every success story are people who carry the **emotional weight of this work daily**.

In the business world, the term "emotional tax" is often used to describe the emotional and mental strain that comes from carrying constant responsibility and pressure. In community work, this burden often remains unseen. It is found in difficult conversations, stories of trauma, limited resources, and the ongoing responsibility of holding hope for others, even when they have lost hope themselves.

Our staff and volunteers do not only carry programs — **they carry people**. They listen, support, encourage, pray, and continue showing up each day to make a difference. This work **does not only transform communities; it also transforms us**. It teaches us compassion, resilience, and the importance of standing together.

That is why we believe **sustainable impact also means caring for the people who serve**. Creating space for support, restoration, and wellbeing is essential if we want to continue building hope in our community. To every staff member, leader, and volunteer: we see not only what you do, but also what it costs you to do it. Your work carries weight, but it is meaningful work — and together, we carry it.





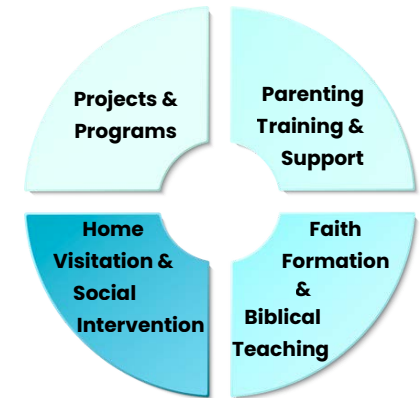

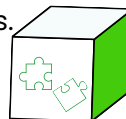

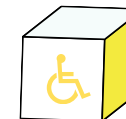

# PROJECT 1

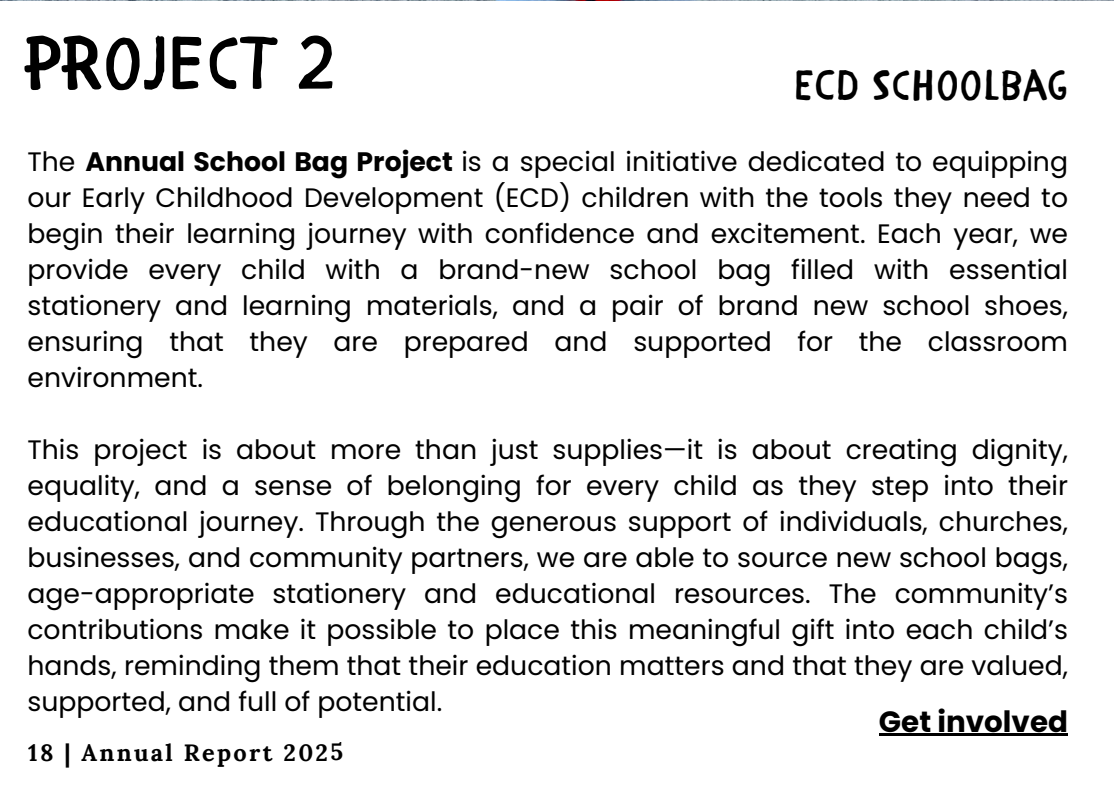
## WINTER CLOTHING

The **Winter Project** is one of our most meaningful outreach initiatives, providing vulnerable children and intellectually disabled adults enrolled in our programs with warmth, dignity, and comfort during the cold winter months. Unlike many seasonal pre-loved clothing drives, we intentionally provide brand-new clothing items to every beneficiary, believing that every person deserves the joy and dignity of receiving something new that was chosen especially for them.

Through this project, beneficiaries receive essential winter items such as rain jackets, tracksuits, socks, underwear, sleepwear, water boots, and warm blankets. Each person is also gifted with a hand-knitted beanie and scarf, lovingly made by community members who invest their time, compassion, and care into every stitch.

The project is made possible through the generosity of individuals, churches, businesses, schools, and supporters who contribute through financial donations, new clothing items, wool donations, and knitted goods. Together, the community becomes part of restoring hope, protecting vulnerable individuals against the harsh winter weather, and reminding each beneficiary that they are seen, valued, and deeply cared for.

# PROJECT 2

## ECD SCHOOLBAG

The **Annual School Bag Project** is a special initiative dedicated to equipping our Early Childhood Development (ECD) children with the tools they need to begin their learning journey with confidence and excitement. Each year, we provide every child with a brand-new school bag filled with essential stationery and learning materials, and a pair of brand new school shoes, ensuring that they are prepared and supported for the classroom environment.

This project is about more than just supplies—it is about creating dignity, equality, and a sense of belonging for every child as they step into their educational journey. Through the generous support of individuals, churches, businesses, and community partners, we are able to source new school bags, age-appropriate stationery and educational resources. The community's contributions make it possible to place this meaningful gift into each child's hands, reminding them that their education matters and that they are valued, supported, and full of potential.

## PROJECT 3

### FOOD

The Food Project plays a vital role in supporting vulnerable families and children within our care and surrounding communities. Through this initiative, we distribute essential food parcels as well as fresh fruit and vegetables that are seasonally donated by local farmers in the area. These contributions help ensure that families receive nutritious, wholesome food that supports both physical health and overall wellbeing.

In addition, donations are used to prepare light meals at our Children's Ministry Program, Avodah Program, and Early Childhood Development (ECD) school, where many children rely on these meals as a consistent source of nourishment during the day—often the only meal they receive.

This project is essential, as many families continue to face ongoing food insecurity, and regular access to healthy meals is critical for children's growth, concentration, and emotional stability.

Emergency food parcels are also provided to families in urgent need, offering immediate relief during times of crisis and hardship. Through the generosity of farmers, donors, and community partners, this project helps restore dignity, relieve hunger, and bring practical hope to those who need it most.

## PROJECT 4

### COMMUNITY OUTREACH:

The Community Involvement Project collaborates with individuals, churches, schools, businesses, and other NGOs. Specific needs are met to come alongside Ma's vir Wellington to ensure we can support and care for children and families in times of need and crisis. In this year, we supported:

#### **Nanna D's Project**

A soup kitchen in our direct community that serves three meals a week to children and the elderly. Some of the children are part of our programs, and during school holidays and times of crisis, Nanna D's serves as our direct line of support in Carterville, providing assistance 24/7 when needed.

#### **New Rest Fire Response**

During the devastating fire of April 2025, we initiated a collective response together with Drakenstein Municipality, NORSA, and Mosaic Community Development to provide immediate relief and support to affected families. Please see the full report below.

#### **WOW Ministries**

Supporting a ministry that provides rehabilitation and support for former convicts and individuals struggling with substance abuse. More than 30 parents and community members from our programs completed two 15-week support sessions over a six-month period.

# NEW REST FIRE REPORT

**Collaboration between Ma's vir Wellington, Mosaic Community Development, NorSA**

On 6 April 2025, a devastating fire swept through the NewRest informal settlement in Wellington, claiming the life of a woman, destroying approximately 200 informal structures, and leaving nearly 800 residents displaced and vulnerable. In response to this tragedy, our team committed three months to supporting affected families through emergency relief and recovery efforts. This included assisting with the identifying need, sorting and distributing of food and clothing parcels, and providing emotional support to individuals and families during a time of deep loss and uncertainty.

- RELIEF EFFORT:**
- Housing for 3 nights to 28 children and elderly woman.
  - Creating a safe space for families to come and bathe.
  - Food distribution for 2 weeks, 1 meal a day
  - Social media awareness to receive donations for emergency relief.
  - Field workers on foot in the community to identify effected families.
  - Surveys collect data to distribute clothes, household items and food parcels to families.
  - Support to moms and babies, with nappies, clothes for babies, sanitary wear,

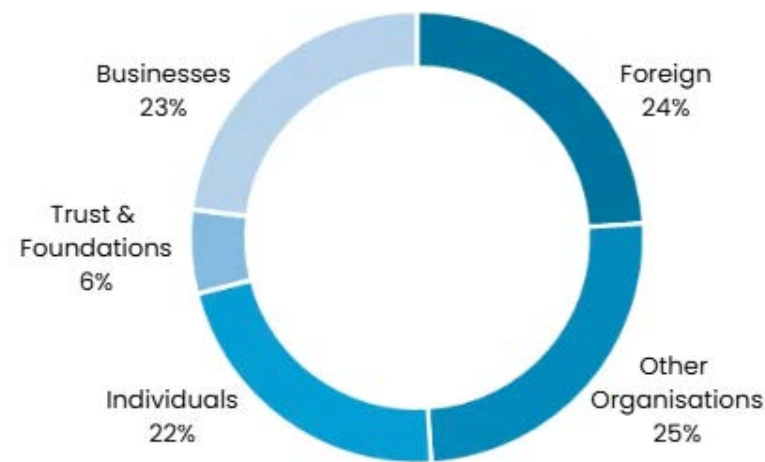
# FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

## FINANCIAL INFORMATION FOR THE ANNUAL REPORT - 28 FEB 2026

The annual financial statements for the year ended 28 February 2026 will be audited during June/July 2026. The IT3d data submission for section 18A certificates has been submitted to SARS before 31 May 2026, and the annual income tax return will be submitted after the audit for the financial year has been completed. All other statutory compliance requirements during the year were met.

Sustained grants received from the Department of Basic Education support the early childhood education programs and increased the income of the company.

We would like to thank our donors for their sustained support in a very difficult and testing economic environment during the current year under review. As a result of their sustained support, the organisation was able to continue its work in the community, as evidenced by the annual report.

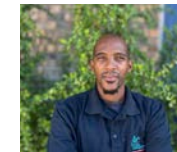

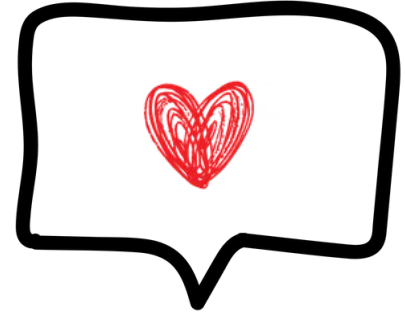
